Music Therapy Tip: Why Do We Use Rainsticks?





The rainstick is a great instrument to use with children and adults of all ages. It is believed that rainsticks originate from Central and South America and are usually made from any of several species of cactus. The rainsticks played at MusicWorks are clear plastic tubes filled with different colored beads and are used as a sensory instrument. Everyone loves shaking the beads from one end to the other and it helps them improve personal focus and attention. A client's rhythm and timing skills are also enhanced through playing the rainstick. The rainstick produces a calming, rain-like sound that can soothe clients.
